Sing it with flowers

Nature cameras in Pinewoods

With funding from North Yorkshire County Council, the Pinewoods Conservation Group

(PCG) has purchased a number of cameras which, over the next few months, will capture images and videos of wildlife in the wood. These will be made available to other Harrogate based groups for their use - that's the cameras, images and videos, not the wildlife!

At the request of landowners Harrogate Borough Council signs have been put up at entrances to the wood to draw attention to this activity as images will be shared on line.

New chicane at Willow Woods

A lot has been done to deter illegal motorcycling along the Nidderdale Greenway and throughout Nidd Gorge but sadly it has happened again.

The Bilton Conservation Group (BCG) has been working with Harrogate Council and North Yorkshire Police in an effort to mitigate this anti-social behaviour by improving the porous Nidd Gorge boundary.

Students from Grove Academy have helped members of the BCG to reconstruct a chicane to deter motorcyclists from gaining access to Nidd Gorge and Nidderdale Greenway from Willow Woods.



During this work signs were put up to recognise that students from Grove Academy have helped make these improvements for the benefit of local biodiversity and so visitors can enjoy this beautiful area without worrying about being run over

Beetles and butterflies ... and an ant or two

The verges of the Nidderdale Greenway between Bilton Lane and Nidd Gorge are particularly rich in wild flora and invertebrates such as ants, beetles and butterflies. The Conservation Group works closely with Harrogate Borough Council (HBC) each autumn to take off the lush vegetation as a 'hay crop' to reduce the fertility of the soil and improve the prospects for wild flowers and native grasses. This should be helpful to species like the large Skipper Butterfly. We photographed this one last July as it fed on Cocksfoot and False Brome. If these verges became too rank the taller species would dominate and the habitat would become scrub and, eventually, a woodland edge.

BILTON BUFO BUFO

Bilton Fields and the Nidderdale Greenway are blessed with lots of common toads (scientific name bufo bufo). Their breeding ponds are at Valley Farm and the old railway reservoir at Starbeck.

Once the breeding season is over they leave the water and disperse to drier habitat as much as three kilometres from where they spawn. They are a frequent and welcome sight along the

Nidderdale Greenway where they wait patiently to ambush caterpillars and slugs.

Planting and propagating

HBC's Central Nursery at Harlow Hill grows over 277,000 bedding plants from seed for summer planting. They will use around 24,000 of these plants in 800 stunning hanging baskets you'll see around the district which create a wonderful floral impact in the district's town centres.

About 600 of them go up in Harrogate and include the 134 offered to HIB at a subsidised rate for us to sell on to Harrogate town centre businesses. Once again businesses have been very supportive and all were sold by the end of February. These baskets which are also watered and maintained by the council will go up first week in June.

New tourist guide

Harrogate town centre and the iconic Valley Gardens are home to many sculptures and installations but, up to now, there has been no definitive guide for tourists to follow.

Step in HIB member Angela Henson who has put that right by producing a new Sculpture and Installation Trail ready for the start of this year's tourist season.

The trail details sculptures, monuments and installations as old as Queen Victoria's Golden Jubilee in 1887, the opening of the New Zealand Garden in the 1950s right up to celebrating the 2014 Harrogate Grand Depart of the Tour de France.

Rossett Sensory Garden

Work is progressing well on Rossett School's sensory garden. There are new footpaths, railings and seating round the pond, there's a new pagoda, fruit trees and the wildflower garden is under way.

Rossett's Jo Clark, who is the garden's driving force, has achieved a lot over the past 15 months working with a number of grant giving bodies including the Audrey and Stanley Burton Charitable Trust and the George Martin Trust. Jo has received grants totalling £6,500 but she needs more so that work can continue.

Jo has also received a huge amount of support from a number of local groups who have either worked on the garden or donated material, plants and trees.

Allotment News

The allotment season has begun with everyone starting to plant their early veg. There are strong waiting lists on the majority of sites but some have plots available at short notice.

The allotment show this year is being held in the Valley Gardens on Sunday 20 August. Our chosen charity this year is Open Country.

The HIB 2017 competition for the allotments is titled 'Second Chance' which interprets to 'what have you recycled on your allotment' or, in true Yorkshire tradition, 'owt for nowt'. We are expecting several of the competition finalists' entries to be displayed/replicated at the Harrogate Autumn Flower Show.

Wild about wildflowers

Hookstone and Stonefall Action Group have been doing a number of surveys over the past few months. They have found an astonishing 68 species of wildflowers at Stonefall Park which is amazing when you think that this used to be an old bricks works/quarry and later

a landfill site. The group has been planting more wildflowers with seeds received from Kew Gardens.



Plans are under way to create a history display board now that photos of the old quarry have been found and the group is also seeking funding to create footpaths over wet areas.

At Hookstone Park the group has been surveying footpaths and a programme of re-stoning these paths is under way. A local scouts' group is keen to get involved and support the group's work.
